Get the Look of Anderson Cooper's Trancoso Escape

Colorful, rustic touches fill the star journalist's inviting Brazilian retreat

When Anderson Cooper divulged his desire to build a home in the remote town of Trancoso, Brazil, his partner, nightclub mogul Benjamin Maisani, and their friend, TV personality Andy Cohen, thought Cooper had lost his mind. The town, located on the Atlantic coast in the state of Bahia, takes a not-at-all-convenient 14-hour trek to get to. But the romance of the rainforest and the inviting nature of the residents beckoned. Before long, Cooper was working with local developer and hotelier Wilbert Das on an out-of-the-way compound that would become the ultimate escape for the news anchor. For the interiors, Das sourced reclaimed materials, gathered vintage items, and employed the talents of regional craftsmen. "I like to feel rooted wherever I happen to be," Cooper says, "so I prefer pieces that reflect something about the local history and style."
