Brazilian design

TriBeCa gallery showcases the best in Brazilian design

GREAT BEACHES, a giant Jesus statue and the thong aren't the only contributions Brazil has made to the world. At TriBeCa's newest Brazilian design gallery, Espasso ("space" in Portuguese), designer furniture pieces reflect the country's remarkable diversity.

"The beauty of the Brazilian style is that there is no one characteristic," says Espasso founder Carlos Junqueira. "You have different cultures living in Brazil. You have a big Japanese community, a big German community, a big Portuguese community - a blend of cultures. And if you look at the designers you'll see that each one is completely different."

Crossing bridges

After four years in Long Island City, Espasso moved to a converted garment factory in Manhattan earlier

this month, making it easier for interior designers and architects to visit the showroom. "You know New Yorkers, they don't cross the bridges too much," says Junqueira.

The new space displays Brazilian furniture pieces both vintage and contemporary, many of which feature Brazil's signature wood. All works in Espasso are certified by a council that aims to conserve the Amazon's rain forests.

"The idea is to show the history of Brazil from the '30s to today," says Junqueira. "In the selection of pieces, you can see how the designers changed as the time passed."

A São Paulo native, Junqueira imported both shoes and coffee before settling

on furniture, pursuing a love for design and art. "I want to explore the contemporary. It's something that's very fantastic, very beautiful. It's very clean and it's very practical."
