WHO WOULDN'T WANT TO BE PART OF THE WORLD'S MOST VIBRAN'
METROPOLIS – NOT ONLY THE HUB OF STYLE AND DESIGN, BUT
A CULTURAL FEAST AND SHOPPING PARADISE? WORDS PAUL PICKSLEY

Whether you've walked its famous avenues or become familiar with it on-screen, New York is one of the world's best-loved cities. Most of us can list its landmarks as if they were our own — Brooklyn Bridge, the Chrysler Building, the Empire State ... but this city has other tourist tressures.

The New Museum (www.newmuseum. org) opened at the end of 2007 as a home for contemporary art, but its unique look, which resembles a series of precariously stacked boxes, makes it a standout.

The Austrian Cultural Forum building (www.acfiny.org), designed by architect Raimund Abraham, is one of Manhattan's most important – and amazing – landmark buildings. At only eight metres wide and 25 metres deep, it still manages to accommodate 24 stores. Worth a look!

Accommodation heavyweights, like the Carlyle, Lowell and Four Seasons, can be found on the Upper East Side, but some great newcomers, such as The Bowery Hotel (www.thebowerybotel.com), are cropping up in low-rise neighbourhoods, giving them fantastic views of the East Village and beyond. Rooms at The London NYC (www.thelondonnyc.com) are spacious (not very New York!) and are in elegant grey, beige and limewash – all designed by David Collins. Gordon Ramsay oversees the restaurant here, which also adds lives.

New York is synonymous with shopping, so spend time in Greenwich Village, so spend time in Greenwich Village, checking out its specialist stores. Highlights include Butik (butikny.com), owned by model-photographer Helena Christensen, hip travel store Flight 001 (96 Greenwich Ave. 212-989-0001) and apothecary C.O. Bigelow (414 6th Avenue, 212-533-2700).

The Lower East Side has several virtage clothing retailers you should visit, including Dear55 (55 Clinton Street, 212-673-3494) and Edith Machinist (104 Rivington Street, 212-0799-9992). The Nolita neighbourhood has become a magnet for young designers and cutting-edge style For starters, check out I Heart (262 Mott Street, 212-219-9265).
